Indeed, I would be loath to refer a patient to any therapist who declared that he almost always felt effective and clear about what was going on. Such a feeling can be maintained, I believe, only by an inordinate amount of bravado and lack of critical self-reflection. But the

First published in 1988, behavioural family therapists worked in an area that had greatly changed since its

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inception over 20 years before. Growing out of the pioneering work of Gerald Patterson,

Robert Paul Liberman, and Richard Stuart, whose backgrounds vary from psychology to psychiatry to social work, behavioural family therapy (BFT) had evolved to encompass systems theory, considerations of

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the therapeutic alliance, as well as approaches to accounting for and restructuring family members' subjective experiences through cognitive strategies. As BFT had not been the 'brain child' of any one charismatic innovator, but rather of a wide array of clinicians and researchers developing

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and rigorously testing

hypotheses, it is fitting

that this much-needed

summation of the field

was a collaborative

product of an array of

well-established

practitioners of the time.

They discuss in Part 1 of

the book the theoretical

parameters of BFT,

focusing on modular

behavioural strategies,

the indications for

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therapy, assessment of family problems, pertinent issues arising in clinical practice, and approaches to the problem of resistance to change. Contributors to Part 2 then apply theory to such clinical situations as ' parent training ' and helping families cope with patients suffering from developmental

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disabilities, alcoholism, schizophrenia, senile dementia, as well as anxiety, obsessive-compulsive, and depressive disorders.

Specific attention is also given to acute inpatient and primary health-care settings. While BFT had already proved quite effective in treating a great number of family problems, it was only in

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its infancy at the time of writing. As Falloon says in his overview ' all exponents of the method are constantly involved with the process of refinement, each clinician is a researcher, each family member is a research subject, and each researcher is contributing to clinical advancement. ' This

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openness, in combination with a willingness to modify 'sacred' tenets of behaviourism while adapting proven techniques from other family therapies, made this title a landmark in its field. As such, it was not only of interest to all clinicians and researchers with a behavioural slant, but

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also to all family therapists who wished to challenge themselves to develop an integrative approach.

One of the most frequent requests I receive from graduate students is for references on how to formulate a complex clinical case. Typically, after reading the recommended

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materials, the student returns to request more detailed accounts of how clinicians "think" about particular cases. The general lack of such materials in the behavior therapy literature led to the formation of the present volume. Throughout much of the behavior therapy literature, one gets the impression that

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most cases seen present circumscribed and straight forward psychological problems.

In my experience, such cases are rare.

Accordingly, the present volume was designed to cover more complex problems such as sociopathy and paranoid personality.

These disorders are rarely discussed in the

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Behavior therapy
literature but
nonetheless seem to
appear regularly in
clinical settings. The

cases presented in this
book are descriptions of
patients seen clinically
by the editor or by the
contributors. Work on
this text began while I
was a faculty member at
Vanderbilt University
and took several years to

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complete. As the contributors would attest, the task I set out for them was atypical and often difficult. The complexities involved in articulating how one conceptualizes a case are numerous and may help to explain why there are so few sources available on case formulation. The fact that our current state of

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This book has a question mark in its title because it aims to invite inquiry. The possibility of integrating psychoanalytic and behavior therapies has been controversial since it was first proposed about 50 years ago, and this has elicited a wide

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range of reactions from both psychologists and psy chiatrists. It was with the hope of fostering constructive interchange that this book was conceived. We wanted to spark further thinking about the question in the title in a way that could lead either to conceptual and clinical progress toward an integrated approach

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or to a clearer sense of the obstacles involved.

In either case, we hoped that it would present a

healthy challenge to

current forms of

psychoanalytic and

behavior therapies. The

present volume was

stimulated by the

appearance in 1977 of

Paul Wachtel's book

Psychoanalysis and

Behavior Therapy:

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Toward an Integration.

Although many reviewers did not necessarily agree with Wachtel's proposals for integration, they (and we) were highly laudatory of his attempt. After reading the book, Hal Arkowitz organized a symposium on integration that took place in Chicago at the November 1978

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meeting of the Association for the Advancement of Behavior Therapy. The symposium included Cyril Franks, Merton Gill, Hans Strupp, Paul Wachtel, and Michael Merbaum as moderator. Arkowitz subsequently proposed to edit a book on integration and invited Messer to be coeditor.

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During the past several decades, the field of mental health care has expanded greatly. This expansion has been based on greater recognition of the prevalence and treatability of mental disorders, as well as the availability of a variety of forms of effective treatment. Indeed,

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throughout this period,
our field has witnessed
the introduction and the
wide spread application
of specific

pharmacological
treatments, as well as
the development,
refinement, and more
broadly based
availability of
behavioral,
psychodynamic, and
marital and family

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interventions. The community mental health center system has come into being, and increasing numbers of mental health practitioners from the fields of psychiatry, psychology, social work, nursing, and related professional disciplines have entered clinical practice. In concert with these developments,

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powerful sociopolitical and socioeconomic forces-including the deinstitutionalization movement of the late 1960s and early 1970s and the cost-containment responses of the 1980s, necessitated by the spiraling cost of health care-have shaped the greatest area of growth in the direction of

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outpatient services. This is particularly true of the initial assessment and treatment of

nonpsychotic mental disorders, which now can often be managed in ambulatory-care settings. Thus, we decided that a handbook focusing on the outpatient treatment of mental disorders would be both timely

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and useful. When we first began outlining the contents of this book, the third edition of the American Psychiatric Association's Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM-III) was in its fourth year of use.

Cognitive therapy is fast becoming one of the more popular and well

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respected forms of psychotherapy. In both research and clinical practice, several advantages of cognitive therapy have been identified. Cognitive therapy is structured enough to provide a therapeutic framework for clinicians, as well as a theoretical framework for clinical researchers, yet flexible enough to

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address an individual's problems in a highly idiosyncratic manner.

Accompanying the popularity of cognitive therapy is the expansion of its application beyond the areas in which it was initially developed and validated (the "traditional" areas of depression and anxiety) to areas where validation has not yet

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occurred (the "nontraditional" areas).

We strongly believe that such broadening of

cognitive therapy should be encouraged, but that

conceptual models to guide the therapist and

researcher in these areas should be explicated. It

is the purpose of this text to provide a
